

CAPITAL & OPERATING REFERENDUM JUNE 9, 2020

UNDERSTANDING SCHOOL FUNDING

The portion of school taxes that is used for the daily operations of a school district, including funds that follow students to charter schools, cannot be increased in Delaware without a successful referendum.





WHAT'S ON THE BALLOT

Voters in Christina School District will be asked four questions regarding funding for our schools.

- Operating: Parts I and II
- Capital: Parts III and IV

Voting for all of the questions will allow students to continue to thrive while receiving a high-quality education.

CAPITAL REFERENDUM

Updating and replacing major building systems and addressing critical maintenance and facilities challenges in Christina schools.

Includes a major investment in our Early Education Center.

Last capital referendum was 2007.

OPERATING REFERENDUM

Funds day-to-day operations including funding for students, instructional supplies and high-quality educators.

Christina has the lowest student to teacher ratio in the state.

Christina has the highest number of students to administrators.

HELP US CONTINUE TO BUILD STRONGER MINDS

For the average home in our school district, taxpayers are being asked to invest less than a dollar a day to be phased in over three years (29¢, 5¢, 5¢)*. The average assessed property value in our district is less than \$65K.

It allows our district to maintain programs, and keep the district from having to reduce supports for classrooms and increase class size.

FISCAL MANAGEMENT

In 2016, after two unsuccessful referendums, we asked for support that would provide funding for 2 years. We have been able to stretch the funding to last 4 years.

Christina School District has reduced spending by more than \$5M over the last 3 years.



WHY NOW?

State funding has not kept pace with inflation during the past decade.

More local funding is needed to maintain smaller class sizes to improve student performance.

Funding for students and educators makes a significant difference in educational outcomes, including test scores and graduation rates.

This represents the cost if all funding is approved.



WHAT DOES IT MEAN?

Part I Operational: 29¢ (year 1)

Includes items such as instructional supplies and materials, discipline support programs, school safety, extracurricular activities and maintenance of facilities.

Part II Operational: 5¢

Includes curricular enhancements such as elementary English language arts.

Parts III and IV Capital: 1.2¢ (.6 +.6)

Includes required learning facility renovations and upgrades targeted for this referendum.

TAX CALCULATOR

For the average home in our district, the increase would be about \$18.81 per month or \$4.70 per week. The increase is phased in over 3 years.

- Average increase for approving Capital Referendum - \$0.65 per month.
- Average increase for approving Operating Referendum - \$18.16 per month

Remember, your taxes are calculated on each \$100K of assessed value, which is different than your property value.


