
Here are a few reminders as we are approaching the winter season:

From the Nurse's Office



As we gather with others for the holiday season whether it is our own extended family members or with others, we may not even know at holiday spectaculars, there is a higher chance of coming in contact with germs that may make us ill. Our first thought is the common cold, the FLU or even COVID. Let's all do our part in staying healthy not only during the holiday season but all winter long. Stay home if you are ill or if think you may be sick and you must go out; wear a mask to prevent spreading germs.

How to Calm



The Dreaded Cough

Catching a cold is normal in the winter when we spend so many hours inside sharing the same air and **GERMS**. Coughing that comes along with the cold is a key part of the body's recovery process, even if it feels and sounds as though your child's symptoms could be getting worse.

Coughing is a normal symptom associated with a cold, and rarely indicates something more severe. The cough reflex clears out excessive mucus and protects the lungs from pneumonia so many doctors do not give medications to stop a cough even though it is very irritating to the sick person. Noisy breathing is normal and results from vibrations of mucus in the nose or pooling in the lower throat and if often referred to as 'rattling in the chest' Coughing up mucus is actually a sign the cold is improving and the infection is starting to break up. We are actually coughing up the damaged cells. The yellow or green sputum (phlegm) is part of the normal healing phase of viral bronchiolitis (usually caused by a cold or flu virus) and it does not mean there is a bacterial infection. It is important to note that a cough can last up to 3 weeks.



What you can do to cope with your cough

Try to rest and make your family member or yourself as comfortable as possible when battling a cold. Many people do not like to eat or drink while sick because of the pain of swallowing and this causes many people to become dehydrated. It is very important stay well hydrated throughout your cold. If your family member is one year old or older, give them warm apple juice, milk or decaffeinated tea with honey in it. The warm liquid can soothe their throat and loosen the mucus. Help clear their chests with a cool mist humidifier or turn on the hot shower and breathe in the steam.

Signs you should see your primary care provider

If your child is coughing up blood. The color and consistency don't really indicate a level of severity and many pediatricians are not too concerned about the color, just whether or not there's blood.

For younger children, it's rare for them to cough and show you any mucus. But if your child is having difficulty breathing or their temperature increases beyond normal, you should contact your pediatrician.

Contact your pediatrician immediately if your exhibiting:

- Blood in the mucus
- Harder or faster breathing
- Using chest or abdominal muscles to breathe
- Tugging or flaring nostrils while breathing
- Uncontrolled fever

Vision To Learn - An Opportunity for Free Eye Glasses Final Visit

During Vision to Learn's Visit to Networks in October, 2024, a total of 29 students were seen by the Optometrist who visited Networks. A total of 25 students have received FREE glasses so far and only 4 did not need glasses!! 18 students will need to wear glasses full time; 3 students need their glasses in the classroom only while 3 need in the classroom and distance. If there are problems with glasses dispensed, please send them into school to be checked when the VISION TO LEARN program returns to Networks again on Thursday, January 23, 2025. If your son / daughter missed the opportunity to participate because they started at Networks in the FALL 2025 or if you changed your mind about participation, you may contact the Networks School Nurse for additional questions about the program: michelle.gayeski@christina.k12.de.us. All that is needed for the student to participate is a completed and signed permission form. PARTICIPATION IS VOLUNTARY and all you need to do is complete and return the attached permission form.



A group of students participated in Pilot Program, Art Works for All, that Networks has been participating in this fall. 








TRADEworks

Winter Solstice

It starts on December 21, 2024

It lasts 1 day

Typical Greeting is Happy Solstice!

What is it all about?

The winter solstice, also known as the hibernal solstice, is the one day a year with the least amount of light as the earth's poles reaches the maximum tilt away from the sun. It is also known as Midwinter; the Shortest Day; the Longest Night; Halfway out of the Dark.

It is celebrated because it means the amount of daylight per day will no longer grow shorter but will start getting longer. The Winter Solstice is celebrated by some cultures by lighting bonfires. Families often decorate with green wreaths and a large dinner. Small gifts may be given to children and outdoor trees are decorated with edible treats.



Christmas

It starts on December 25, 2024

It lasts 1 day

Typical Greeting is Merry Christmas!

What is it all about?

Christmas is a religious and cultural holiday. Christians observe Christmas as the birth of Jesus. The name Christmas comes from the Mass of Christ (or Jesus) Many individuals and families will also go to church.

Christmas is a celebration of gift-giving, family and social gatherings, symbolic decoration with lights, Christmas trees and ornaments. Families come together to enjoy special meals and feast.



Santa Claus is a legendary figure who is the traditional patron of Christmas int he United States and other countries . His popular image is based on traditions associated with Saint Nicholas and is usually dressed in red. Santa Clause is said to live at the North Pole with his wife Mrs. Claus and spends time making toys with the help of his elves. The night before Christmas, known as Christmas Eve, children will hang stockings by the fireplace for Santa Claus to fill with gifts brought on his sleigh and 8 reindeer. He often helps himself to cookies and milk that is left out by the household's children.



Hanukkah

It starts on December 25, 2024 at sunset

It lasts 8 days

Typical Greeting is Happy Hanukkah!

What is it all about?

Hanukkah is a religious and cultural holiday celebrated by Jewish People and may be known as the "festival of lights." It reaffirms the ideals of Judaism and commemorates the rededication of the Second Temple of Jerusalem. During Hanukkah, each family member will light the menorah (a special candle holder with 9 candles) each night for 8 nights starting on the right side. Hanukkah commemorates the "miracle of the oil" from thousands of years ago when there was only enough oil to provide light for one night but it lasted for 8 nights. Families will often play a game called dreidel and will eat special food called latkes. Children receive one gift each night of Hanukkah. This holiday normally occurs between late November and December, although the exact date changes every year as it follows the Hebrew calendar.



Boxing Day

It starts on December 26, 2024

It lasts 1 day

Typical Greeting is Happy Boxing Day!

What is it all about?

Boxing Day began as the day when servants would receive a "Christmas Box" from their employers to thank them for their work all year and servants would be given the time off. It began when Queen Victoria was on the throne and the wealthy would box up items they no longer needed to give to the poor. Later, boxing day was once a day to donate gifts by all people to those in need. Boxing day has evolved to become part of Christmas festivities, with many people choosing to shop for deals.

Today, it is celebrated as a cultural holiday by families coming together and having a large meal. Each person is usually given a "cracker," which is a small toy that will pop open when pulled to reveals small toy inside. Schools and stores are closed on Boxing Day in Britain, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, and other Commonwealth countries where Boxing Day is celebrated.

Boxing day is not celebrated in the United States.



Kwanzaa

It starts on December 26, 2024

It lasts 1 week

Typical Greeting is Habari Gani? (This is Swahili for "What's the news?" or "How are you?"

What is it all about?

Kwanzaa is a non-religious and cultural holiday that honors the African-American culture. Each day of Kwanzaa is dedicated to one of the 7 principles:

Umoja (unity) kujichagulia (self-determination) ujima (collective work and responsibility) ujamaa (cooperative economics) nia (purpose) kuumba (creativity) imani (faith)

The mishumaa are 7 candles (3 red, 3 green, 1 black) that represent these principles. The "black" represents the people. The red is for blood spilled in the struggle for liberation. The green is for the future of Black liberation. Kwanzaa is celebrated with family, friends and the community. The fest culminates in a communal fest called Karamu usually on the sixth day. On the seventh night, gifts are exchanged. Homemade gifts are preferred and they should relate to the holiday's principles. Children are usually the recipients and must always include a book and a "heritage symbol."



New Year's Day

Typical Greeting is Happy New Year!

What is it all about?

New Year's Day is a cultural holiday celebrating the first day of the new year. Celebrations start on December 31 and at midnight, there is typically a countdown and everyone celebrates the moment one year ends and the next year begins. Often times, families and friends gather together to share a meal and "ring in" the new year with a toast and a song. This moment is sometimes celebrated by:

- dropping balloons
- lighting sparklers
- throwing confetti
- banging pots and pans
- watching the ball drop in Times Square

Superstition dictates that you shouldn't:

- wash any clothes
